
Methodology – Survey Specifications

- The survey was conducted with a state-wide sample of Latino adults (N = 1,000 / +/- 3.1%) across the state of Colorado from August 16 September 1, 2021.
- Data was collected through a blended approach including web-based and telephone interviews (both landlines and cell phones) in either Spanish or English at the respondent's discretion.
- Respondents were recruited with up to 5 contacts to improve the representativeness of the sample.
- Data were compared to the best-known estimates of the U.S. Census Current Population Survey (CPS) for demographic profile of Colorado adults and post-stratification weights were applied to bring the data into direct balance with Census estimates.

Hispanic is the preferred pan-ethnic term

While a sizable segment of Colorado's population prefers Latino/a, the label Hispanic continues to have the widest traction for most people in our community.


Which term do you prefer to describe your ethnicity?




National Origin & Immigration











Language Use Among Latinos in Colorado

- There is a large Spanish speaking segment of the Latino population.
 One indicator is that 17% of respondents in the representative sample preferred to conduct the survey in Spanish.
- Effective outreach and communication to the Latino community in Colorado must therefore be done bilingually.
- In fact, 30% of all respondents reported that they prefer to receive information about politics in both English and Spanish. Another 16% reporting Spanish is their preferred language for political information.


During the coronavirus pandemic, did your household experience any of the following? (% yes)




 Latinos aged 18-29 are more likely to experience the same economic stress indicators

An alarming 42% of Colorado's Hispanic population have only \$1,000 or less in savings for financial emergencies, 20% with an astonishing \$100 or less




Federal Policy Issue Priorities Among Latinos

They are closely followed by discrimination and the COVID-19 pandemic.




Local Policy Issue Priorities Among Latinos

"What about here in Colorado? What are the most important issues that you want local Colorado officials to address?"


At the state level, **affordable housing** and **homelessness** are








Attitudes Toward the Political Process & Motivations for Civic Engagement


- "When you do vote, what is the main reason why you vote?"

 - To make my voice heard in our democracy (22%)




Latino's Views About Voter Suppression in Colorado



Role of Ethnic Identity in Political Behavior






Discrimination Experiences Among Latinos

Although a slim majority (53%) of respondents did not report any experiences of discrimination, nearly half had at least one of the following negative experiences over the past year:

- 25% have been called an offensive name or told to go back to another country because they are Hispanic or Latino.
- 22% have been criticized for speaking Spanish in public
- 23% have experienced some form of discrimination or been treated unfairly because of their ethnic background.

Key Findings – COVID-19

- The survey makes clear that the COVID-19 pandemic has been devastating to the Latino community.
 - Not having enough food to eat.
 - Difficulty paying their bills or utilities.
 - Difficulty paying their rent or mortgage.
 - Work hours/pay cuts or had someone in their household lose their job.
 - Using all, or nearly all, of savings to pay for expenses
- Latinos support expanding relief funds to help state residents who are facing pandemic related economic challenges, including setting up a state fund to help Latino owned small businesses in the state.

Key Findings – Policy

- In general, Latinos in Colorado support public policies that expand access to services and resources to a wider segment of the state's population.
 - High support for expanding access to health insurance for Colorado residents
 - Ensuring state residents have access to safe abortion and reproductive health
 - Ensuring all state residents have access to high-speed internet.
- Latino residents of the state are also very concerned with climate change and strongly support policies that will transition the state toward clean energy production
- Latinos are highly interested in being more engaged in the political process but often feel that the voice of the Latino community is excluded from important political decisions.
