Methods statement:

In collaboration, the Center for Mexican American Studies at the University of Texas-Arlington and University of Nebraska-Lincoln commissioned a national poll of Mexican nationals living in the U.S. who are eligible to vote in the 2024 Mexican Presidential election on June 2, 2024. The Mexicans Abroad International Survey of Elections/Encuesta Electoral Internacional de Mexicanos en el Extranjero (MAISE), administered by the polling firm BSP Research, surveyed 600 total respondents, including a sample of dual citizens who are also eligible to vote in the 2024 U.S. elections, from April 5-19, 2024. The survey contains a margin of error of +/- 4.0 percentage points.

En colaboración, el Center for Mexican American Studies de la Universidad de Texas-Arlington y la Universidad de Nebraska-Lincoln publicaron una encuesta nacional de ciudadanos mexicanos residentes en Estados Unidos que son elegibles para votar en las elecciones presidenciales de México el 2 de junio de 2024. La Encuesta Electoral Internacional de Mexicanos en el Extranjero/Mexicans Abroad International Survey of Elections (MAISE), administrada por la empresa encuestadora BSP Research, encuestó a 600 participantes en total, incluyendo una muestra de encuestados con doble nacionalidad que también son elegibles para votar en las elecciones de Estados Unidos de 2024. The survey was conducted in collaboration with Professors Xavier Medina Vidal (Center for Mexican American Studies at UT Arlington), Sergio C. Wals (University of Nebraska-Lincoln), and Edward D. Vargas (BSP Research), all leading experts in U.S.-Mexico relations, and the politics of Mexico.
